Rating Rationale and Key Rating Drivers

The ratings reflect Soneri Bank's ("SNBL" or the "Bank") improved business profile as reflected by system share of 1.8% in terms of deposits as of Sep'22. SNBL's customer deposits observed growth of 6.9% since Dec'21, where CASA recorded further 19.9% improvement to stand at PKR 337.2bln (Dec'21: PKR 281.3bln). Net income witnessed a decrease of 45.1% during 9MCY22 as compared to same period in previous year attributable to higher markup expense. Improvement in net mark-up income and continued enhancement in non-fund-based exposure are important for future years. Advance book recorded 17.7% uptick whereas, infection ratio declined to 4.9% as of Sep'22 (Dec'21: 5.9%). The Investment book witnessed attrition by 16.2% since Dec'21, mainly due to divestment from market T-Bills. In order to increase the advances book capacity, the Bank has issued tier-II capital amounting PKR 4bln. The tier-II is exposed to non-payment (principal & interest) risk in case the CAR falls below the minimum regulatory requirements. Being cumulative in nature, the interest payment falling due during that specific period would be paid to the investors once the CAR meets minimum regulatory requirement. The Bank's total Capital Adequacy Ratio (CAR) stood at 14.14% as of Sep'22, while the issue of new tier-II instrument strengthens the CAR further. Going forward, the macro-economic environment is beset with myriad challenges due to heightened interest rate, tightening of demand, rupee depreciation and higher inflation.

The growth trajectory of the bank especially nurturing of the deposit & advances base and enriching the granularity would be considered positive.

Issuer Profile

Profile Soneri Bank Limited (SNBL), incorporated as a public limited company, commenced operations as a Scheduled Commercial Bank in 1991. Soneri Bank's registered office is situated at 2nd Floor, 307-Upper Mall Scheme, Lahore; while its central office is located at 10th Floor, PNSC Building, M.T. Khan Road, Karachi. The Bank is engaged in provision of banking and financial services. At end-Sep'22, The Bank operates with 367 (CY21: 367) branches including 35 Islamic banking branches, 15 Islamic banking windows, and 1 sub branch in Pakistan.

Ownership The Feerasta Family - sponsors of the Rupali Group, own 65.04% stake of the Bank; mainly through three trusts and individuals of the sponsor family. Other shareholders mainly include NBP which through NIT holds 9.31% stake. The remaining stake 25.65% is widely spread among financial institutions, and general public. Ownership structure of the Bank is seen as stable as no ownership changes are expected in near future. Majority stake will rest with the Feerasta family. The Feerasta Family has been associated with some other businesses, since last few decades. Their business acumen is considered good. Given that Soneri is the flagship business of sponsors, willingness to support the Bank in case the need arises is considered high.

Governance The overall control of the Bank vests with eight-member board of directors (BoD), including the CEO. Three of the board members are nominees of Feerasta family. There are two independent directors on board, namely Mr. Jamil Hassan Hamdani & Ms. Naveen Salim Merchant and one NIT nominee director, Mr. Manzoor Ahmed. The board members carry extensive professional experience in banking and other sectors. The BoD provides an overall guideline in managing risks associated with the Bank's operations and strategic direction. There are six board committees which assist the board in effective oversight of the Bank's overall operations on relevant matters. KPMG Taseer Hadi & Co., Chartered Accountants have expressed an unqualified opinion on the financial statement for the year ended 31st December 2021. SNBL has an Internal Audit function which reports to the Board Audit Committee in line with the Code of Corporate Governance.

Management Overall operations have been divided into thirteen functions and organized into Northern, Central and Southern regions for effective management and control. SNBL's management team comprises of experienced individuals. Mr. Muhtashim Ahmad Ashai joined the Bank as CEO in Apr-20. He is a seasoned Banker and carries over 28 years of banking experience. He is supported by Deputy CEO (formerly Executive Director) - Mr. Amin A. Feerasta - who has been associated with the Bank since 1999. SNBL has nine management committees in place; all headed by the CEO. These committees ensure the efficiency of Bank's overall operations. The Bank has deployed 'Temenos T24' as its Core Banking System in CY18. More recently, the Bank made substantial investments to add value to its risk management framework by purchasing software from AFS solutions as replacement of SAS solutions, also upgraded its data center and disaster recovery solutions.

Business Risk Pakistan's economy has gone through several varied phases in last two years. It was deeply impacted by the magnitude of the COVID19 pandemic. The economic activity revived after wards and Pakistan posted a GDP growth rate of ~4.0% in FY21. This revival was again hindered by flood disaster in FY22 and brought the post flood GDP down to ~2%. Banking sector continues to flourish with high profitability. Banking sector weightage is approximately ~25% of the KSE 100 index. Total banking assets posted growth of 14.9% whilst investments surged by 23.6% to PKR ~18.0trln in Sep'22 (end-Dec'21: PKR ~14.5trln). Net Advances of the sector grew 9.2% to stand at PKR 11.1trln (end-Dec'21: PKR ~10.9trln). Non-performing loans witnessed uptick to PKR 898bln. Capital Adequacy Ratio stood at 16.6% (regulatory requirement of 11.5%). The banking sector deposits closed to PKR 23.8trln at end-Sep'22. Hence, ADR rationalized to 46.4% (end-Dec'21: 46.6%). Net profitability of the sector recorded at PKR 214bln YTD (9MCY21: PKR 192bln); up 11.4% YoY. However, growth of equity base of the sector recorded uptick of 6.6% YoY. The market share of deposits of the Bank enhanced to 1.8% (Dec'21: 1.4%). During 9MCY22, SNBL's NIMR witnessed marginal decrease of 8.04% YoY to stand at PKR 7.8bln (9MCY21: PKR 8.4bln), however Markup income witnessing an increase of 59.6% YoY to stand at PKR 45bln (9MCY21: PKR 28.2bln). Subsequently, Asset yield of the Bank increased to 12% (9MCY21: 8.8%). Hence, Bank's spread declined to 2.6% (9MCY21: 3.0%). During 9MCY22, non-mark-up income augmented by 33.8% to stand at PKR 4.1bln (9MCY21: PKR 3.0bln) mainly due to foreign exchange income. Non-markup expenses inclined by 20% YoY to stand at PKR 9bln (9MCY21: PKR 7.5bln). Consequently, non-markup expenses to total income increased to 76.1% (9MCY21: 65.5%). Net profit decreased by 45.1% and stood at PKR 1,295mln only (9MCY21: PKR 2,358mln). The Profitability stream is hindered due to higher non-markup expenses during the period. The management's focus is to improve the Bank's sustained market share while remaining compliant to minimum capital requirements. Focus remains on building a stable deposit base, improving customer experience, and optimizing returns through growth strategies and by enforcing a strong cost discipline across the Bank. Focus of the Bank remained tilted toward digitalization of processes to deliver best services to consumer. CY21 and 9MCY22 has been a year of strategy refresh for the Bank as the management looked forward to build on core strengths.

Financial Risk At end-Sep'22, SNBL's net advances have increased by 17.7%. Bank's ADR was reported at 45.6% (end-Dec'21: 41.9%). Non-performing advances of the Bank recorded augmentation to stand at PKR 2.8bln (Dec'21: 2.4bln). However, infection ratio decreased to 4.9% (end-Dec'21: 5.9%). As at end-Sep'22, SNBL has an investment book of PKR 274.3bln (Dec'21: PKR 327.4bln) with majorly skewed towards Government securities (97.9%). SNBL's exposure in T-bills decreased to 18.1% (end-Dec'21: 40.9%), while exposure in PIBs increased to 72.2% (end-Dec'21: 52.5%). This trend has been witnessed throughout the industry due to incline in interest rates during the year. As at end-Sep'22, deposits increased to PKR 434bln (end-Dec'21: PKR 403bln), up by 7.7%. CA and SA proportion stood at 28.4% (Dec'21: 27.2%) and 49.3% (Dec'21: 42.6%). At end-Sep'22, the Bank reported CAR of 14.14%, comprising of Tier-I capital (13.6%), remaining compliant with the minimum requirement by SBP.

Instrument Rating Considerations

About The Instrument The Bank has issued rated, to be listed, unsecured, subordinated, ten years tenured term finance certificates with an issue size of PKR 4bln bearing exercisable call option after five years of the issue date. As per the lock-in clause requirements for Tier 2 issues, neither profit nor principal will be payable in respect of TFC, if such payment results in a shortfall in the bank's Minimum Capital Requirement (MCR) or Capital Adequacy Ratio (CAR) or results in an increase in any existing shortfall in MCR or CAR. Additionally, as required by the SBP, the issuer shall also monitor its Leverage Ratio (LR) requirements before any profit or principal repayment in respect of the TFC. Being cumulative in nature, the interest payment falling due during that specific period would be paid later to the investors once the CAR meets minimum regulatory requirement. The bank may call the TFCs (either partially or in Full), with prior approval of SBP, any time after five years from the date of issue, subject to not less than 30 days prior notice being given to the investors. The call option once announced will not be revocable. In conformity with SBP Basel III Guidelines, the TFCs shall, if directed by the SBP, be fully and permanently converted into ordinary shares and/or have them immediately written off (partially or in full) upon the PONV Trigger Event. The Issue amount contributes toward the Issuer's Tier II Capital for capital adequacy ratio as per guidelines set by SBP and have a floating rate coupon priced @6MK+1.70%. The first such profit payment will fall due at the end of sixth (6th) month from the Issue Date and subsequently every six (06) months thereafter. The instrument will redeem 0.36% of the issue amount during the first 9 years after the Issue Date and the remaining issue amount of 99.64% in two equal semi-annual installments of 49.82% each in the last year.

Relative Seniority/Subordination Of Instrument The TFC is subordinated to the payment of principal and profit, to other indebtedness of the Bank, including deposits, but will rank pari passu with other Tier 2 instruments and superior to Additional Tier-I instruments. The instrument is subject to the loss absorbency and/or any other requirements under SBP's Basel III Capital Rules.

Credit Enhancement The instrument is unsecured.

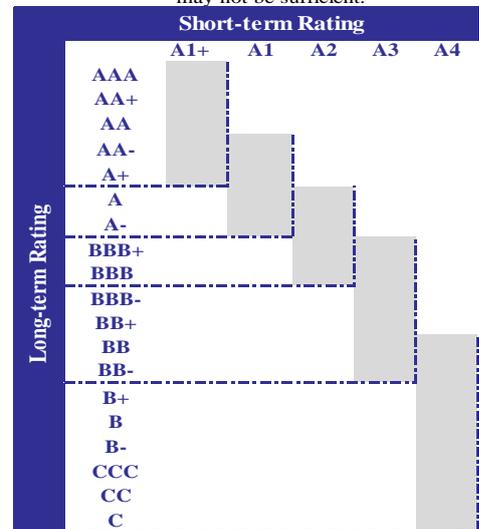

Credit Rating

Credit rating reflects forward-looking opinion on credit worthiness of underlying entity or instrument; more specifically it covers relative ability to honor financial obligations. The primary factor being captured on the rating scale is relative likelihood of default.
